## Former Athens Banker Passes

**OXFORD, N. C., Jan. 18—**  
Welby C. Jordan, 81, retired Ath-  
ens, Ga., banker and former  
Georgia Masonic leader, died at  
Grantville Hospital Saturday  
after a short illness of a cerebral  
hemorrhage.

The funeral is to be conducted  
at 11 a. m. Monday at St. Steph-  
en's Episcopal Church by the rec-  
tor, the Rev. Alban Richey. Bur-  
ial will be in Elmwood cemetery.  
The family requests omission of  
flowers.

Born in Wilcox county, Georgia,  
December 1, 1878, a son of the  
late Cornelius and Sallie Cason  
Jordan, he had been a resident of  
Oxford for the past several years.  
Mr. Jordan was a 32nd degree  
Mason, a past master of Mt. Ver-  
non Lodge in Athens, a past grand  
high priest of the Masonic Grand  
Lodge in Georgia and a past com-  
mander of Godfrey de Bouillon  
Commandery and a member of  
York Temple of the Shrine.

He was a former president of  
the American State Bank of Ath-  
ens, Ga., and a former chairman  
of the board of the former Geor-  
gia National Bank of Athens.

Surviving are his wife, the for-  
mer Charlotte Morris; a son,  
Lewis M. Jordan of Albany, Ga.;  
a daughter, Mrs. W. Henry Hunt,  
Jr., of Oxford; and a granddaugh-  
ter.

## Ike To Ask Aid Soon For Allies

**WASHINGTON, Jan. 18—(AP)—**  
President Eisenhower soon will  
ask Congress for authority to use  
up to one billion dollars worth of  
surplus products to help strength-  
en the economies of friendly  
countries.

by Secretary of Agriculture Ben-  
son in a statement before the  
Senate Agriculture Committee,  
outlining the administration's  
new farm program.

**BERLIN, Jan. 18—(AP)—**Ex-  
perts for the Big Four set to work  
today to plan security and house-  
keeping details of the Berlin for-  
eign ministers conference. A com-  
promise last night on sites for the  
session assured that the parley  
will open on schedule next Mon-  
day.

The American, British, French  
and Russian commandants of the  
divided city appointed deputies to  
meet late today to work out de-  
tailed arrangements for the con-  
ference on German unity and the  
Austrian peace treaty.

**Time and Place Set**  
Orders from their home gov-  
ernments ended 10 days of  
wrangling over the conference  
site. The three Western military  
chiefs and Soviet Commandant  
Sergain Dengin agreed last night  
that the ministers will meet for  
one week — the second — in the  
Soviet Embassy in East Berlin,  
and for the first and third weeks  
in the building in the American  
sector formerly used by the Allied  
Control Council.

Thereafter, a communique said,  
"the place of meetings will de-  
pend upon the course of the con-  
ference."

**Russian Stand**  
The Russians at first had de-  
manded that half the meetings,  
including the opening session, be  
held in East Berlin. The West  
sought at first to hold only one-  
fourth of the meetings in the  
East.

"Let the Russians have a tiny  
triumph if that is what they re-  
gard it to be," one Allied spokes-  
man said. "We believe that the  
main point is to get around the  
table on Germany and Austria  
and see if some international  
agreement can be found."

The agreement disappointed fears  
that the Russians would monkey  
wrench the conference before it  
even started unless they could se-  
cure the prestige of launching it  
in their own back yard.

The "Little Four" deputies now  
will determine the makeup of the  
conference secretariat, arrange  
for communications and security,  
and decide on policies for hand-  
ling the 1,000 or so men and wo-  
men of the international press  
corps about to descend on the  
city.

U. S. Secretary of State Dulles,  
British Foreign Secretary An-  
thony Eden and French Foreign  
Minister Georges Bidault are due  
here Friday for last-minute strat-  
egy discussions. Soviet Foreign  
Minister V. M. Molotov is expect-  
ed Saturday or Sunday.
